1 The County Counsel 2 County of Orange 3 4 CHAIRMAN DO: So let's go to the public hearing 5 at this time, item number 37. Madam Clerk, please go 6 7 ahead and read the item. 8 CLERK OF THE BOARD: For the County Executive Office public hearing to consider input on proposed 9 10 2021 redistricting maps. Select map proposal to be 11 published on November 17th, 2021 for formal adoption on November 22nd, 2021. 12 13 CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you. Let me get situated 14 We got a lot of paperwork on this item so I here. 15 don't want to get all mixed up up here. 16 For the public, we have had four modifications 17 submitted by myself and three of my colleagues. And 18 so what I -- um, we're going to open up the public 19 hearing in a minute here. 20 The process is after public hearing, I'm sorry, 21 public comments, um, then I -- and in closing of the 22 public hearing -- then I will turn to you, 23 colleagues, to make the appropriate as you see fit. 24 I will, um, go by order of district, about 25 numerical order. I will go last just to take the any

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1 and unfair advantage I may have out of the equation. 2 Okay. So we will then -- when we entertain motions 3 we'll start with district 2 and 3 and then so on from 4 5 there. Okay. So that's how we will proceed. Did you 6 7 read the item already, Madam Clerk? CLERK OF THE BOARD: 8 Yes, I did. 9 CHAIRMAN DO: Okay. So I'm going to open public 10 hearing at this time. Please call the speakers. How 11 many we have? 12 CLERK OF THE BOARD: Mr. Chairman, we have 13 received 40 requests to speak and County Counsel has 14 two comments to read into the record. 15 CHAIRMAN DO: Did you say 40? 16 CLERK OF THE BOARD: Uh-huh. CHAIRMAN DO: So I give each speaker three 17 18 minutes, um, so we are now 10 to 11:00 that will take 19 us to 1:00. Okay. Let's go ahead and start. 20 CLERK OF THE BOARD: The first three speakers are 21 Mayor Fred Minegar, Councilwoman Janine Heft, 22 Councimember Don Sedgwick. 23 FRED MINEGAR: Good morning, Chairman Do, 24 Supervisor Chaffee, Supervisor Wagner, Supervisor 25 Bartlett, and Supervisor Foley. I'm Mayor Fred

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1 Minegar representing 66,400 residents of the 2 beautiful city of Laguna Niguel. Before I start talking about the specific item I 3 wanted to thank and appreciate what you do as be --4 as representing people of Orange County. 5 It's a tough job for all of you. I've been sitting here 6 7 listening to you and I wish you all the best. 8 Um, last month and again this month on November 12, 2021 on behalf of the entire City Council of 9 10 Laguna Niguel I submitted letters to Orange County 11 Board of Supervisors expressing my concerns about 12 redistricting. I'm here to follow up on my previous letters 13 14 expressing my concerns about the proposed 15 redistricting maps. 16 Several of these proposed maps break up South 17 Orange County into two or more districts. There are 18 11 cities in South Orange County, Aliso Viejo, Dana 19 Point, Laguna Beach, Laguna Niguel, Laguna Hills, 20 Laguna Woods, Lake Forest, um, Mission Viejo, Rancho 21 Santa Margarita, San Clemente, and San Juan 22 Capistrano. 23 All these 11 cities that I mentioned they have a 24 lot of commonalities that should preclude them from 25 being split into separate supervisorial districts.

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For example, many of these South Orange County 1 2 cities contract with Orange County Fire Department, Fire Authority, Orange County Sheriff's Department 3 for emergency services, all these 11 cities have the 4 same kind of school system. 5 For example, we are a part of Capo Unified School 6 7 District. Other cities in South Orange County are part of Saddleback Valley Unified School District. 8 And the City of Laguna Beach is a part of Laguna 9 10 Beach Unified School District. 11 Additionally all the 11 South Orange County 12 cities fall within the jurisdiction of Orange County 13 community college district. 14 Furthermore, all these 11 cities that I have 15 mentioned are general law cities and have comparable 16 ideologies to the management of public services. 17 The demographics of South Orange County cities 18 are relatively homogeneous throughout the region and 19 the communities will be best served by remaining in 20 the same supervisorial district. 21 I urge you to consider the similarities of all 22 these 11 cities that I mentioned and continue to have 23 them remain together in a cluster in a collective 24 district. 25 Thank you very much for all of your hard work on

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1 the redistricting process and for always being 2 mindful of the needs of the entire county. Sincerely, Fred Minegar, mayor city of Laguna 3 And thank you for giving me time to talk 4 Niguel. about this --5 CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you, your time is up. 6 7 FRED MINEGAR: -- item. Thank you. 8 JANINE HEFT: Good morning, supervisors. Most of I'm Laguna Hills Councilwoman 9 you already know me. 10 Janine Heft, and I'm speaking today on behalf of both 11 my city as well as South Orange County cities that 12 were not able to be here to save South Orange 13 County's representation and keep the fifth the fifth 14 by adopting either proposal 2A1 or 2A. 15 The 11 South Orange County cities south of the El 16 Toro Y have always been considered a community of 17 interest. And after talking to over a dozen of my 18 South Orange County colleagues no one wants to see 19 the fifth be torn into pieces which is many of the 20 options that have been presented effectively do. 21 There are many reasons we need to keep South 22 Orange County together as one community of interest 23 and here are just a few: One, all cities and maps in 24 2A1 and 2A are contract cities for the Orange County 25 Sheriff's Department and the Orange County Fire

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Authority; two, all cities in these two maps are 1 2 served by just two public schools, Capistrano and Saddleback Valley; three, all these cities are 3 located in a contiguous area between -- between the 4 5, 405 Y and the San Diego County border; four, all 5 these cities have only one freeway as their main art 6 7 material, the 5 Freeway; and, five, all these cities are small to medium size communities. My city is 8 only 32,000 people composed mostly of residential 9 10 neighborhoods.

If they are split in half and thrown in with large cities like Huntington Beach, Newport Beach, or Irvine, they will be completely marginalized.

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Also according to the redistricting criteria for drawing supervisorial district lines, the County of Orange lists its second priority and I quote, "That the geographical integrity of local neighborhoods or community of interest shall be respected in a manner that minimizes its division."

20 But several proposals especially 4C1 would split 21 not only South Orange County but split my little city 22 of Laguna Hills into three parts and my neighboring 23 city of Aliso Viejo into two parts.

Sometimes you to have make the maps bigger to see these divisions and how they really, you know, tear

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1 apart my city and other cities in Orange County, 2 South Orange County. Proposals 2A1 or A would preserve the integrity 3 of these cities and ensure that South Orange County 4 residents would maintain their voice with the Board 5 of Supervisors so that their specific needs including 6 7 fire protection, public safety, and other central 8 services can be effectively addressed. All of you were once local city leaders yourself 9 10 and I know you understand how important it is to have 11 a voice in county government. 12 So I will you will agree that the voters of South Orange County should not be disenfranchised by 13 14 breaking them into two or more districts as proposed 15 by the other maps. 16 Please support either proposal 2A1 or 2A to make 17 sure that South County does not lose its 18 representation and that my city of Laguna Hills is 19 not cut into pieces. Thank you. 20 CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you. 21 CLERK OF THE BOARD: The next three speakers are 22 Councimember Don Kaski, Councimember Thai Phan, and 23 Diane Harkey. 24 DON KASKI: Good morning. Um, I'm Don Kaski and 25 I'm a newly appointed City Council person from the 9

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1 city of Laguna Hills.

2	And last two speakers I think spoke very plainly
3	and succinctly about why this is so important to us
4	not to break up these cities. We have 11 cities.
5	I've live there for 40 years, by the way. And those
6	contract cities all work together almost as if we
7	were one city in many respects.
8	And we we contract with the sheriff. We contract
9	with the fire department. Janine Counselman Heft
10	just mentioned to you our relationship with two
11	school districts.
12	The fact is and in many respects it's all worked
13	very well and yell you're you're going to be
14	making decisions here that will affect every
15	district. And we we really implore you to let our
16	cities stay together in one district.
17	And so I also will just re-echo we ask you to
18	select scheme 2, 2A, or 2A1 because they do
19	essentially keep it keeps us mostly together, and
20	that's what we're asking. Thank you so much.
21	CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you.
22	THAI PHAN: Good morning, Chairman Do,
23	supervisors, I am a little nervous here more nervous
24	than I am in court. My name is Thai Viet Phan. I am
25	a councimember representing ward 1 in the city of
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Santa Ana.

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2	I'm here today to urge you to support map A, 2A1.
3	I was the first Vietnamese American elected to
4	represent residents in Santa Ana. And we did that
5	because we settled a California Voting Rights Act
6	lawsuit showing that Vietnamese, specifically Asian
7	residents in Santa Ana, were not being represented.
8	Similarly the City of Garden Grove also set a
9	California Voting Rights Act lawsuit going to
10	districts because Latino residents there were not
11	being represented.
12	Maps 2A1 is the only map that's ensures that the
13	Vietnamese community in Santa Ana who historically
14	belong with the Little Saigon community will be with
15	an Asian plurality district.
16	Map 2A1 is the only map that ensures that the
17	Latino residents in Garden Grove will be represented
18	in the Latino majority district.
19	I am real excited because it's not often that
20	when we come to redistricting that there is
21	bipartisan support for a map.
22	And today 2A1 is that map. It ensures that we
23	have an Asian plurality district that brings together
24	immigrant communities to ensure that we have a voice
25	on this dais that Little Saigon is not jammed packed
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into a district with Beach Cities.

I -- I love my colleagues in Huntington Beach, however, Vietnamese refugees trying to make it work, we're a working class community and we don't belong in a Beach City district.

Moreover, those other maps will dilute the Asian American vote here in Orange County. Santa Ana settled that Voting Rights Act lawsuit and we are not going back.

10 The only map before you that ensures that south 11 county cities are fairly represented, that the Asian 12 American communityis fairly represented, and that the 13 Latino community is fairly represented is Map 2A1.

14So I hope that all of you can support a map that15ensures communities of interest stay together, that16ensures that we meet the requirements of Section 217and the Federal Voting Rights Act, the California18Voting Rights Act and is honestly the right thing to19do.

And with that, um, I hope you support Map 2A1.
Thank you.

DIANE HARKEY: Good morning. Dianne Harkey,
 resident of Dana Point, former elected but nothing
 anymore.

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I -- I appreciate the work you've gone through.

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1 This is really the tough -- a tough decision and it will be your legacy decision for the County of Orange 2 make no bones about it. There's nothing else you 3 will do that will effect and impact our county more. 4 I am here to support Map 2A1 because it keeps 5 south county together. It's very important. 6 7 As you've already heard we have OCFA and the sheriff is contract cities our waters -- with the 8 exception of Lake Forest -- we are all governed by 9 10 Region 9, San Diego Regional Water Quality Board, not 11 Santa Ana. We get our water supply -- we can't get 12 it from ground water. Ground water is north of the Y 13 for the most part, central and northern Orange 14 County. 15 So our transportation, some of these maps would 16 split it so that part of South Orange County would 17 have virtually no representation on OCTA. And I 18 don't think that works because we do have a lot of 19 issues down there. 20 Our streets are not grid pattern. They can't be. 21 They're hilly. They're like spaghetti. And so to 22 try to fit these north/south routes and east/west 23 routes is very, very difficult. 24 We formed a south Orange County major investment 25 study that keeps South Orange County on the map for

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1 funding for future needs. We also have an economic 2 coalition for South Orange County that has been there really to be the voice of those areas south of the Y. 3 It's really important to us that we have 4 representation, and I know you're doing the best you 5 You've already heard about our school 6 can. 7 districts. You know, there's just so many 8 commonalities. 9 So I hope that you will support Map 2A1, keep our 10 cities together, allow us to have a voice in South 11 Orange County and, um, thank you very much. I know, 12 like I said, this has been a very tough decision and 13 it's been grueling for all of you but I'm hoping my 14 voice will help to move you a little bit in the way 15 to support my area. 16 I've been there 40 years living in the same city. 17 I love the city. I've served it on the assembly --18 or the -- the area. I've served it in the assembly. 19 I've served it on Board of Equalization. I was a 20 mayor. 21 So I -- I know the issues, and I know them 22 backwards and forwards and I really hope you will 23 keep us together. Thank you. 24 CLERK OF THE BOARD: The next three speakers are 25 Mel Beale, Ed Choy, and Kathy Hahn.

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MEL BEALE:Good morning, Chairman and Councilmembers -- supervisors -- excuse me -- um, my name isMel Beale.Mel Beale.and I also represent the Airport Working Group ofOrange County who most of you are familiar with.

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I come today not to look at a particular map because there are dozens of other interests here and I can't speak to all those. And you have many issues to balance and redistricting. I understand that and I respect that.

11 That being said, regardless of the politics and 12 issues that you address and I've detailed this in a 13 letter which has been distributed to you, the needs of the various local communities a most critical 14 15 requirement for Orange County redistricting is to 16 ensure that the John Wayne Airport remains in the 17 same district as the citizen of those communities of 18 interest most impacted by its operations including 19 residents of Newport Beach, Costa Mesa, and other 20 corridor cities.

For almost 40 years the Airport Working Group of Orange County, AWG, if you know it as that way, the city administration of Newport Beach and other community groups have worked closely with the county and John Wayne Airport management to build a truly

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collaborative framework to address issues which arise and which must be dealt with a fair and equitable manner. And I appreciate the work we've all done together with the county and with the airport.

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The only way this model can continue to be successful is for the political boundaries of any new district include the physical airport and those local communities, Newport Beach, et al, which AWG supports as one of the most important real community of interest entities serving the broader population.

Please ensure this remains the case for the final approved district plan. I repeat, we must, we must keep John Wayne in the same district as the departure corridor cities Newport Beach, Costa Mesa and others.

I appreciate your time and please consider that
as you look at the other options available. Thank
you so much.

ED CHOY: Good morning, um, the Board of
Supervisors. Um, always appreciate the hard work
you're putting in for our Orange County area.

21 My name is Ed Choy, Pastor Ed Choy, um, I serve 22 at a church in Thanksgiving, a church in the city of 23 Buena Park. I also live in the city of Fullerton. I 24 also serve on the advisory board on the Navigation 25 Center that which is a homeless shelter, um, in the

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1	city of Buena Park. And, um, I also volunteer my
2	time as a Police Buena Park police chaplain since
3	I was a retired Army chaplain.
4	And so I come before you today on behalf of the
5	Korean American Federation of the Orange County that
6	represents the Korean American community in Orange
7	County.
8	I have lived in Orange County area for almost all
9	my life, and I write this letter in support of
10	plan or the map of 5A or 5B, um, and because it
11	reflects the concept of equality and the community of
12	interest that best represents the Korean American
13	community.
14	Today many people say that Buena Park is now the
15	second K Town or Korean Town. For those who know in
16	L.A. there's a Korean Town but because of businesses,
17	residents of Koreans who live and work there, um,
18	Buena Park has become now what we call it Second K
19	Town.
20	Um, and the reason why I'm bringing this up is
21	because the proposal for Map 2 has a significant flaw
22	particularly because it separates Buena Park from the
23	other as, you know, the North Orange County cities
24	including Fullerton, Brea, La Habra and Anaheim. And
25	instead it puts Buena Park with Garden Grove,

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Westminster, and Fountain Valley where my deep love and care and support for the Vietnamese American community.

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4 Um, you know, when the Army -- I served with many 5 those who are Vietnamese Americans and I have the 6 utmost respect, love, and care for the Vietnamese 7 people, the Vietnamese community, um, and much 8 affection towards them, um, because we're both people 9 who struggle with war against communism in North 10 Korea and with North Vietnamese.

But that being said, as you know not all Asians are the same. Okay. We share -- even though we might be Asian in descent but we don't share the same kind of community, language, even political climate, or cultural views, even religious backwards.

But in the past 10 years most of the Korean
Americans in Garden Grove have moved their residency
and businesses to North Orange County which includes,
like I said, Buena Park --

CHAIRMAN DO: Your time is up, sir. Please wrap
it up.
ED CHOY: Can I get one more minute, sir?
CHAIRMAN DO: No, you can't.
ED CHOY: So my -CHAIRMAN DO: One more sentence. Please wrap it

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1 up. 2 ED CHOY: So let me wrap it up. Okay. Again, thanks for your time. I'll wrap it up. Okay, sir. 3 All right. So, um, what I'm proposing --4 5 CHAIRMAN DO: No, you cannot --ED CHOY: (Inaudible) 6 7 CHAIRMAN DO: Sir. 8 ED CHOY: -- community --9 CHAIRMAN DO: Wrap it up. 10 ED CHOY: -- supervisors would you please vote 11 for plan -- or map 5A or 5B? 12 CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you. 13 ED CHOY: Which best represents the Korean 14 American community. 15 CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you. Your time is up. 16 Thank you for your time and have a --ED CHOY: 17 KATHERINE HAHN: Hi, my name is Katherine Hahn 18 and I have been a Korean American resident of Newport 19 Beach for 40 years. 20 I would like to voice my strong objection to the 21 proposed Map 4C1. I believe this map violates the 22 California Fair Maps Act in politically targeting a 23 sitting candidate. 24 This map also dilutes the API and Latino, um, 25 representation much more than the other maps.

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Lastly, Map 4C1 unnecessarily splits 14 cities 1 2 across different supervisor districts. When possible, I believe cities should be kept intact in 3 the same supervisor district. 4 I would strongly encourage the Board of 5 Supervisors to vote no on Map 4C1. I would encourage 6 7 the Board of Supervisors to vote yes on any of the 8 following maps, 2A1, 5, 5A, or 5B. Thank you. I would like to CHARLENE KASNER: Good morning. 9 10 thank you for all your hard work and dedication that 11 you are doing for this redistricting effort for all 12 of us in Orange County. My name is Charlene Kasner. I am a resident of 13 14 Garden Grove and I am with Pacific Islander Health 15 Partnership. We advocate for good health, well-being 16 for the native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander 17 communities. 18 I am here in support of proposals 5, 5A, or 5B. 19 We support 5, 5A, or 5B because they respect all 20 Asian American and native Hawaiian and Pacific 21 Islander communities including Vietnamese Americans 22 in Garden Grove, Westminster; native Hawaiians and 23 Pacific Islanders, um, excuse me -- Korean Americans 24 in Buena Park, Fullerton and diverse Asian American 25 populations in Irvine.

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As a reminder by law the maps should not center 1 2 around partisanship. To ensure fair representation for all Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, please 3 support proposals 5, 5A, or 5B. Thank you very much. 4 KIMBERLY HALL BARLOW: Good morning, Supervisors. 5 Kimberly Hall Barlow here on behalf of the City of 6 7 Costa Mesa. I am its city attorney. You have 8 received letters from, I think -- I know the mayor and I believe most of the other council members, um, 9 10 advocating for keeping Costa Mesa together. That is 11 a critical point for the City of Costa Mesa that no 12 districts, um, be adopted that would split the city 13 in any way even with seven residents in one districts since that is an area of upcoming of growth in the 14 15 City of Costa Mesa. So that's number one priority. 16 Number two is to maintain Costa Mesa together 17 with Huntington Beach and Newport Beach. You heard 18 earlier about the -- the common interests of cities 19 of Newport Beach and Costa Mesa with respect to the 20 They share school districts. airport. They have 21 many, um, long-standing contractual and border 22 relationships with Newport Beach and Huntington 23 And to be divided into different districts Beach. 24 would be a disservice not only to Costa Mesa but to 25 Newport Beach and to Huntington Beach as well.

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Um, I notice that the recommended action is to 1 2 select a map or maps for publication so that you can then select one. 3 It really would not be proper to select a single 4 map today even though there's only one that we 5 support because you are required to publish for seven 6 7 days before you adopt. Leaving one map on the table 8 is is essentially adopting a map today. Um, it also appears or could appear to many that 9 10 moving Costa Mesa out of District 2 in many of the 11 configurations that are offered by the other maps would be done for a -- to favor or discriminate 12 13 against a political party, that would be very 14 inappropriate. 15 Um, finally I want to note that Costa Mesa is in 16 the central SPA. It's not in the southern SPA. So 17 it's not part of the south county cities who 18 understandably want to maintain their integrity in 19 one district. 20 So on behalf of the City of Costa Mesa we 21 respectfully request that when you do select a map 22 that it be Map 2A1. Thank you very much. 23 JONATHAN PAKE: Good morning, Members of the 24 Board, my name is Jonathan Pake. I was born in 25 Fullerton, live in Brea and am a life-long resident

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1 of Orange County.

2	I serve as the executive director of the Orange
3	County Civic Engagement Table or OCCET, a non-
4	partisan Asian American, Pacific Islander, Latinx,
5	Labor Environmental Justice Alliance based in Garden
6	Grove that is dedicated to engaging county residents
7	year around to build and to help build an Orange
8	County that serves everyone equitably and with
9	justice.
10	OCCET helped establish the People's Redistricting
11	Alliance, a coalition of 16 community based
12	organizations whose goal is to center low-income
13	communities of color and working families in both
14	state wide and local redistricting processes.
15	Our proposal, Proposal 5, centers federal voting
16	rights at compliance and communities of interest that
17	reflect the needs of the county's most impacted
18	residents. Our map 1 draws an effective Federal
19	Voting Rights Act district around cohesive Latinx
20	communities in and around Santa Ana. Two, keeps low
21	income immigrant communities with common needs and
22	concerns together in South Fullerton and West
23	Anaheim.
24	Three, maintains the integrity of Little Arabia
25	and West Anaheim. Four, keeps predominantly low

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1 income refugee communities in West Garden Grove, 2 Westminster, and North Fountain Valley together. Five, keeps Pacific Islander communities whole in 3 Garden Grove. Six, maintains the integrity of the 4 disproportionately immigrant cities of Irvine and 5 Costa Mesa, draws them together in the same district 6 7 and separates them from more affluent communities, Yorba Linda and Anaheim Hills. 8 And finally, complies with the California Fair Q 10 Maps Act and the California Constitution that would 11 ensure that no district specifically favors or 12 discriminates against a particular political party. 13 It's important to note that our map does not 14 fracture a Latinx communities outside Santa Ana where 15 adjacent Latinx communities of interest can be drawn 16 together, they are. 17 For example, Latinx communities in east Garden 18 Grove and parts of Tustin are drawn into the new 19 Federal Voting Rights Act district with the 20 adjacent -- with the adjacent city of Santa Ana. 21 To the north Latinx communities in north Buena 22 Park are drawn together with west Anaheim and south 23 This allows for fair representation for Fullerton. 24 one of Orange County's largest communities. 25 Proposal 5A and 5B makes minor modifications to

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1 our original map. Because these changes maintain the 2 integrity of our communities of interest and do not compromise the spirit of our work. 3 We also support proposals 5A and 5B. To ensure a 4 fair map that reflects the interest of all Orange 5 County residents we ask that you support proposals 5, 6 7 5A, or 5B. Thank you. JULIA GOMEZ: Good morning, Members of the Board 8 of Supervisors. My name is Julia Gomez and I'm a 9 10 staff orange at the ACLU of Southern California. 11 Yesterday the ACLU sent the Board a letter 12 raising serious concerns with the extreme 13 partisanship of some of the draft supervisorial maps 14 and we urge you to review the letter if you haven't 15 already before taking a vote on a final map and 16 reject all versions of Proposals 2 and all versions 17 of proposal 4 as well as reject proposals 5A, dash, 1 18 and 5A, dash, B1. 19 We urge you to instead support proposal 5, 5A or 20 As we've continuously emphasized to the Board 5B. 21 throughout this process, the Fair Maps Act explicitly 22 prohibits partisan jerrymandering and provides that 23 the Board, quote, "Shall not adopt a supervisorial 24 map that discriminates" -- excuse me -- "shall not 25 adopt supervisorial district boundaries for the

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1 purpose of favoring or discriminating against a 2 political party. The California Constitution also prohibits partisan gerrymandering. It prohibits the 3 Board from discriminated against Democratic voters 4 because of their party affiliation. It prohibits the 5 Board from, um, impeding on fair and free elections 6 7 such that the Board should not adopt a map that is -that determines who will be elected for the Board of 8 Supervisors and instead allows the will of the voters Q 10 to decide.

And it prohibits the Board from infringing on the free speech and association rights of voters including Democratic voters who have chosen to associate with the Democratic party and express their free will by voting for Democratic candidates.

For at least the past decade Democratic voter registration in the county has been turning upward. And Democratic voters now make up 37.1 percent of all active registered voters. They are the largest amount of voters by Democratic by party in the county.

Nonetheless, as we highlight in detail in our
letter all versions of proposal 2 and all versions of
proposals 4 include a partisan advantage for
Republican voters in at least three of the five

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districts, when again they only constitute 33 percent of all registered voters and that is turning downwards.

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Um I also want to highlight that sips I see that 4 5 my time is running out that it's not just about voter registration. If you look at past state-wide 6 7 elections including the 2018 election and even the most recent recall election, the highest share of 8 voters in the county continues to be and is 9 10 increasing to be in the preference of Democratic candidates. And we urge you to reject maps. 11 Again 12 approve all versions of Proposal 2, all versions of 13 Proposal 4 as well as proposals 5A, dash, 1 and 5A, 14 dash, B.

Um, and one last point I make is that the Supreme
Court of the United States has made clear that state
courts are fairly well suited to adjudicate these
types of cases.

19These are not illusory rights. These are rights20that can be enforced in court, and we urge you to do21what's right and not make the same mistake as in222011. Thank you.

SUSAN CHANG: Good afternoon. My name is Susan
 Chang and I'm speaking on behalf of AHRI for Justice.
 Our organization serves low-income individuals and

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1 families, undocumented workers, young people, and 2 survivors of domestic violence through our many programs such as civic engagement, youth organizing, 3 and direct legal services.

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In addition, we're a member of the People's Redistricting Alliance, a coalition of 15 communitybased organizations established to promote a greater community voice in state wide and local redistricting processes here in Orange County.

10 The communities of interest we serve consist of 11 Asian American, Latinx, Pacific Islander undocumented 12 and immigrant communities, LGBTQ folks and low-income 13 communities of color.

14 Many of these communities face similar issues due 15 to the lack of resources provided such as lack of 16 affordable housing due to gentrification and lack of 17 rent control and even lack of resources and support 18 when cities were shut down due to stay-at-home orders 19 back in March last year.

20 Many of our base members come asking for housing 21 assistant services and mutual aid fund.

22 Residents want nothing more than to have their 23 fair share of resources so their communities can 24 thrive. Many of the students we work with want to 25 see ethnic studies implicated -- implemented in K

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through 12 schools. They want community gardens, affordable housing, and accessible mental health resources. And yet resources are spent on creating more unaffordable housing, new parking structures, and businesses.

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6 Due to how the lines are currently drawn, 7 resources are not being allocated to the communities 8 in need. I'm worried about some of the maps that are 9 submitted and concerned that some of these maps have 10 not been drawn in good faith and are drawn to favor 11 political parties rather than community needs.

Again and again the needs of our underserved communities such as Asian American, Latinx, Pacific Islander, immigrant and low-income communities of color are not addressed.

In order to ensure that our communities are
represented, I urge the Board to adopt Map 5, 5A, or
5B thank you for your consideration in making Orange
County residents feel represented.

20 KRISTINA NGUYEN: Hello, and good morning. My
21 name is Kristina Nguyen. I am a resident of Irvine
22 and I am with the Orange County Asian of Pacific
23 Islander Community Alliance, OCAPICA, an organization
24 based in Garden Grove.

We serve the broader Orange County community with

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1 community-based programs aimed to improve and expand the community's opportunity through service, 2 education, advocacy, organizing, and research. 3 We are also dedicated to enhancing the health and 4 social and economic well-being of Asians and Pacific 5 Islanders in Orange County, California. 6 7 I am here in support of Proposal 5, 5A, and 5B. 8 We support -- we support Proposals 5 and 5A because it puts forth a cohesive and whole Irvine. 9 10 Proposal 5B is a compromise that citizens of 11 Irvine are willing to support. 12 These proposals consider the Asian American and 13 Pacific Islander communities in Orange County such as 14 the Vietnamese Americans in Garden Grove and 15 Westminster, native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders 16 in Garden Grove, Korean Americans in Buena Park and 17 Fullerton and the diverse American -- Asian American population in Irvine. 18 19 We ask the commission to consider the Fair Maps 20 Act when choosing a final map as we have concerns 21 over partisan maps. 22 The redistricting process is one that should 23 prioritize the community and their voices first. As 24 a resident of Irvine we urge you to keep the 25 communities of Irvine whole and together as possible. 30

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To ensure fair representation for Asian Americans 1 2 and Pacific Islanders, please support Proposal 5, 5A, or 5B. Thank you. 3 Sydney PANDIS: My name is Sydney Pandis and I a 4 program coordinator for the Orange County Asian and 5 Pacific Islander Community Alliance, OCAPICA, an 6 7 organization dedicated to serving the broader Orange 8 County community by addressing public health, economic inequity, and social justice. 9 10 I am here in support of Proposal 5, 5A or 5B. We 11 support proposals 5 and 5A because it puts forth a 12 cohesive Irvine. Proposal 5B is a compromise that 13 the citizens of Irvine are willing to support. 14 These proposals consider the Asian American and 15 Pacific Islander communities in Orange County such as 16 the Vietnamese Americans in Garden Grove and 17 Westminster, the native Hawaiians and Pacific 18 islanders in Garden Grove, Korean Americans in Buena 19 Park and Fullerton and the diverse Asian American 20 population in Irvine. 21 Proposals 5A and 4C divide Asian communities 22 within Irvine. 23 We have concerns over partisan maps and urge the 24 commission to consider the Fair Maps Act. In order 25 to ensure fair representation for all Asian Americans

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and Pacific Islanders and to keep Irvine whole please 1 2 support Proposal 5, 5A or 5B. Thank you. Hello, good morning. My name is MANNY DELEON: 3 I am a resident of Irvine and I'm with 4 Manny Deleon. Orange County Asian Pacific Islander Community 5 Alliance or OCAPICA, an organization based in Garden 6 7 Grove dedicated to enhancing the health, social, and 8 economic well-being of Asian Americans and Pacific 9 Islanders in Orange County. 10 I am here today in support of Proposal 5, 5A, and 11 We support proposals 5 and 5A because it puts 5B. forth a cohesive and whole Irvine. 12 13 Proposal 5B is a compromise citizens of Irvine 14 are willing to support. These proposals consider 15 Asian American and Pacific Islander communities in 16 Orange County such as the Vietnamese Americans in 17 Garden Grove and Westminster, native Hawaiians and 18 Pacific Islanders in Garden Grove, Korean Americans 19 in Buena Park and Fullerton, and the diverse Asian 20 American population in Irvine. 21 In effort to understand community needs over 22 concerns over partisan maps, please consider the Fair 23 To ensure fair representation for all Maps Act. 24 Asian American and Pacific Islanders and to keep 25 Irvine whole, please support Proposal 5, 5A or 5B.

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Thank you.

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2 KAYLA: Hello. My name is Kayla, and I am a staff member with OC Environmental Justice. We are 3 part of the People's Redistricting Alliance and as an 4 environmental justice organization, we are explicitly 5 concerned about the maps proposed and how they break 6 7 up environmental justice communities throughout 8 Orange County.

9 These configurations break up the influence in 10 environmental justice concerns in south Fullerton and 11 west Anaheim and even some of the environmental 12 justice interests in Irvine around the airport.

In a case our communities across the county are heavily impacted by housing and security, rent, police brutality and health concerns from soil led poisoning of our kids, water quality poisoning our families or air quality poisoning us at our work place.

This needs to stop and we need to have adequate
representation which leads us to our concerns over
the proposed and altered maps.

These partisan maps are breaking our communities and breaking the law for all reasons mentioned by the ACLU. Please comply with federal and state laws and follow the community maps 5, 5A, or 5B. These are

1 the only maps that preserve our communities. Thank 2 you. CLERK OF THE BOARD: Mr. Chairman, the next three 3 speakers have requested a translator so their time 4 will be doubled to six minutes. 5 The next three speakers are Blanca Rueles, Alma 6 7 Chavez, and Irene Bautista. CARMEN ALVARADO: Hello, good morning, Board of 8 Supervisors. My name is Carmen Alvarado and I Q 10 represent Orange County Congregation Community 11 Organization. Our work is centered in organizing low-income communities of color and OCCCO works to 12 develop grass roots leaders across the county to 13 14 bring forward systemic change to the most 15 marginalized communities. 16 Today I'm here in support of Proposal 5, 5A, and We support proposals 5 and 5A because it puts a 17 5B. 18 cohesive and whole Irvine. And Proposal 5B is a 19 compromise that the citizens of Irvine are willing to 20 support. 21 Um, in addition not only do these maps draw 22 federal Voting Rights Act districts around 23 communities of interest, um, in Santa Ana but they do 24 it in a way that ensures all Latinx communities in 25 Orange County have a voice.

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1 Um, as you know Santa Ana is the home of the 2 largest most established Latinx community in Orange Um, and this community has a lot in common 3 County. with nearby Latinx communities in east Garden Grove 4 and parts of Tustin and should be in the same direct 5 as the similarly Latinx communities in south 6 Fullerton have a lot in common with those in Buena 7 8 Park and west Anaheim. So they should also be within that same district. Q 10 Um, many of the other maps leave the Latinx 11 communities outside of Santa Ana without a voice. 12 And proposals 2 and 2A isolate Latinx communities in 13 Buena Park, south Fullerton, east Garden Grove, and 14 Tustin rather than draw them together with similar 15 Latinx communities nearby. 16 Proposal 4, 4A and 4B isolate Latinx communities 17 in east Garden Grove. 18 So please take into account the Fair Maps Act 19 when making your decision to ensure fair 20 representation for Latinx community via fair map that 21 is compliant with state and federal law. So please support proposals 5, 5A, 5B. 22 Thank you 23 so much. 24 CLERK OF THE BOARD: Okay. Mr. Chairman, now the 25 timer will be doubled for the next three speakers. 35

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1 **BLANCA RUELES:** (Spanish spoken) 2 THE INTERPRETER: Good --**BLANCA RUELES:** 3 (Spanish spoken) THE INTERPRETER: Good --4 **BLANCA RUELES:** (Spanish spoken) 5 THE INTERPRETER: Good morning, Orange County 6 7 Board of Supervisors. 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1 BLANCA RUELES: (Spanish spoken) 2 THE INTERPRETER: That's why I'm here to support the proposals of maps 5, and 5A, and 5B. 3 BLANCA RUELES: (Spanish spoken) 4 THE INTERPRETER: Because they not only represent 5 the Santa Ana communities but every other Latin 6 7 community in the surrounding areas. 8 **BLANCA RUELES:** (Spanish spoken) Which are very similar to maps 9 THE INTERPRETER: 10 2A, 4A, and 4B. 11 (Spanish spoken) BLANCA RUELES: 12 THE INTERPRETER: Because they leave communities 13 like North Tustin, east Garden Grove, south 14 Fullerton, and Buena Park divided without any voice 15 for the Latino community. **BLANCA RUELES:** 16 (Spanish spoken) 17 THE INTERPRETER: Please I ask you to support 18 proposals propositions 5, 5A, and 5B to protect the 19 democracy of the community of the Latin community. 20 Thank you again. 21 (Spanish spoken) ALMA CHAVEZ: 22 THE INTERPRETER: Good morning, Orange County 23 Board of Supervisors. 24 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) 25 My name is Alma Chavez and I'm THE INTERPRETER: 37

1 leader of the OCCCO organization. 2 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) I have lived in the city of THE INTERPRETER: 3 Fullerton for the past 21 years. 4 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) 5 THE INTERPRETER: And I attend the Santa Maria 6 Church in Fullerton. 7 8 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) It is very important to me the 9 THE INTERPRETER: 10 redistricting issue. 11 (Spanish spoken) ALMA CHAVEZ: 12 THE INTERPRETER: Which could affect my community for the next 10 years. 13 14 (Spanish spoken) ALMA CHAVEZ: 15 THE INTERPRETER: For the time that I have lived 16 in this community, the Latin community has grown. 17 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) 18 THE INTERPRETER: That's why I'm here supporting 19 the proposal of maps 5, 5A, and 5B. 20 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) 21 THE INTERPRETER: I support these proposals 22 because they represent all the Latin -- all the 23 communities especially the Latin community. 24 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) 25 THE INTERPRETER: Not only in Santa Ana but the

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1 surrounding cities which could be the most affected 2 ones. (Spanish spoken) 3 ALMA CHAVEZ: THE INTERPRETER: These maps will be the most 4 5 fair of maps. ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) 6 7 THE INTERPRETER: Other maps such as map 2A, 4A, and 4B will leave the Latin communities --8 9 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) 10 THE INTERPRETER: --- Buena Park, south Fullerton 11 will be the most affected ones. 12 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) 13 THE INTERPRETER: And in south Fullerton I will 14 be -- and we will be, um, mostly affected by this. 15 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) 16 THE INTERPRETER: And we will have no voice to represent our communities in the City of Garden Grove 17 18 and Tustin. 19 (Spanish spoken) ALMA CHAVEZ: 20 THE INTERPRETER: If we are to be separated by 21 nearby communities with which we have common 22 interest. 23 (Spanish spoken) ALMA CHAVEZ: 24 THE INTERPRETER: I'm not only asking this as a community leader but also --25

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1 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) 2 THE INTERPRETER: -- as a mother of five I'm here fighting for the rights of my five children. 3 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) 4 THE INTERPRETER: I am here as a mother, 5 grandmother, and citizen of the community. This is -6 7 - that is why --8 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) THE INTERPRETER: -- I'm here asking you to 9 10 please support Proposition 5, 5A and 5B. 11 ALMA CHAVEZ: (Spanish spoken) 12 THE INTERPRETER: Thank you for listening to me. 13 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) 14 THE INTERPRETER: Good morning, Orange County 15 Board of Supervisors. 16 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) 17 THE INTERPRETER: My name is Irena Bautista. I'm 18 a community leader with OCCCO. 19 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) 20 THE INTERPRETER: I live in Garden Grove and I 21 attend Episcopal Del Macia church in Santa Ana. 22 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) 23 THE INTERPRETER: I've been part a member of this 24 community for the past 20 years. 25 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken)

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1 THE INTERPRETER: And I'm very -- it's very 2 important to me this redistricting because it could affect my community in the following 10 years. 3 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) 4 THE INTERPRETER: In the time that I have lived 5 here, the Latinx community has grown a great deal and 6 7 we deserve representation at county level. 8 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) THE INTERPRETER: That is why I support 9 10 proposition 5, 5A, and B because we all deserve 11 respect in the Latinx communities. 12 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) 13 THE INTERPRETER: Not only in the city of Santa 14 Ana but the surrounding cities. 15 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) 16 THE INTERPRETER: Because people like me which 17 will be the most affected ones. 18 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) 19 THE INTERPRETER: Other maps such as 2A, 4A, and 20 4B --21 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) 22 THE INTERPRETER: -- leave communities like the 23 ones in Buena Park, south Fullerton --24 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) 25 THE INTERPRETER: -- east Garden Grove and

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1 Tustin --2 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) THE INTERPRETER: -- without a voice with the 3 communities which we have shared interest. 4 5 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) THE INTERPRETER: I ask you please to support 6 7 proposals --8 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) 9 THE INTERPRETER: -- 5, 5A, and 5B. 10 IRENA BAUTISTA: (Spanish spoken) 11 THE INTERPRETER: Thank you and God bless you. 12 CLERK OF THE BOARD: Mr. Chairman, the timer will 13 be reset for three minutes. 14 CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you. 15 BETTY CHU: My name is Betty Chu, and I live in 16 the, um, District 3. 17 I urge all of you to vote for the Map Proposal 2 18 and I have sent each of you by e-mail this time my 19 comments regarding the unconstitutionality of 20 Proposition 5, 5A, and 5B as well the reasons why 21 Proposition 2 meets the criteria of all the 22 Constitutions and the laws and the particularly the 23 Voting Rights Act. 24 And, um, Proposition 5, 5A, and 5B have -- has reduced the district of influence of the Asians from 25

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1 38.4 percent to 32.2 percent. 2 But in that same district, the Hispanic area of influence is over 80 -- 38 percent. So you see. 3 That is no area of influence if you're influence is 4 overcome by someone else's influence. 5 The, um, District 5 which is the minority 6 7 Hispanic, um, majority Hispanic minority voting 8 district, the highest percentages also appear in District 5 of propositions 5, 5A, and 5B. 9 10 Um, but -- however, District 2 in Proposition 2 11 also has that 67.9 percent. 12 So we do not in any way hamper the rights of 13 other minorities in respect to having a 14 majority/minority district nor do we hamper any of 15 the rights of the majority voting districts. 16 The spread of the five maps is all over 9.5 17 percent which is a great number of times over the 18 1.95 percent of Proposition 2 which is the lowest. 19 And if you talk about the splits of the cities, 20 the splits are about the same. The Proposition --21 Proposal 5 have splits of -- of cities up to 15 and 22 16 parts similar to that of Proposal 2. 23 However, Proposal 2 only splits singly in all of 24 the cities that are split, whereas in Proposal 5 they 25 are split sometimes three times and sometimes four

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1	times I'm sorry into three parts or four parts.
2	It is to be noted that the reason 32.2 percent is
3	so low is in your packet. And therefore it's
4	unconstitutional.
5	CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you. Your time is up.
6	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: First of all, I urge
7	support of Proposal Number 2.
8	Second of all, um, two weeks ago I also asked the
9	question, um, whether a public hearing had to be
10	after 6:00 o'clock on a week night or on a weekend.
11	I was actually given the answer by Lisa
12	Bartlett's office the other day that, um, the public
13	hearings in August satisfied that requirement of
14	afternoon of having district meetings.
15	But, however, when I look at AB849 and again I
16	just am looking what I read it says that the
17	public hearings have to adhere to the standards after
18	the maps were drawn, is my interpretation of AB849
19	and the maps weren't drawn that I remember. I think
20	November 2nd is when it was they were produced for
21	the council for the, um, public to see.
22	So that's November 2nd. I don't see a meeting
23	that takes place on a weekend or after 6:00.
24	Again, I'm only looking at what I'm reading and
25	that would be great to have somebody now give me the

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1 answer to that.

2	Also I'm not sure about how all the people in
3	that room over there are there, um, and they're able
4	to go there but we cannot sit in there or even sit up
5	here.
6	Other people came in today. I know there were
7	mayors and dignitaries that were able to sit in that
8	room. Did they not have COVID? I'm just asking the
9	question if we have more germs than everybody there.
10	So I think you're smiling at me, Don.
11	Um, just asking the question why we can't be up
12	here. There's a whole room full of people over there
13	sitting close together. Maybe we just have more
14	infection rate, the public people.
15	VINCENT TRAN: All right. Good morning, Board of
16	Supervisors. My name is Vincent Tran. I am a
17	resident of Fountain Valley and a part of VietRISE, a
18	non-profit based in Little Saigon.
19	I'm here to support maps 5, 5A, and 5B. These
20	maps are the only maps proposed that have been
21	received extensive feedback and was created by
22	diverse communities and maintains communities of
23	interest together.
24	They respect all Asian American and Pacific
25	Islander communities including Vietnamese Americans
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in Garden Grove and Westminster, native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders in Garden Grove, Korean Americans in Buena Park and Fullerton and diverse Asian American populations in Irvine.

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In addition, a large population of Vietnamese seniors live within mobile home parks in Westminster, Midway City, and Garden Grove. And they should be kept together within the same district rather than separated.

10 The maps to reflect districts that unite our 11 communities who are facing similar systemic issues 12 and require the same language needs and maximize the 13 representatives accountability to them such as 14 addressing skyrocketing rent increases and the 15 displacement of immigrants and refugees.

16 I'm concerned that as we reach the end of this
17 process the voices of interest of politicians are
18 outweighing the needs of Orange County residents.

For the redistricting process for the people to
decide who they want to elect rather than elect it's
choosing who they want to represent.
Please choose maps 5, 5A, or 5B. Thank you.

STEVE (Inaudible): Good morning, Orange County
 Supervisors, my name is Steve (Inaudible). I'm
 president of Korean American Federation of Orange

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1 County.

2 On behalf of the Korean American Federation of Orange County that's represents the Korean American 3 community in Orange County. 4 I -- I write this letter in support of Map 5A or 5 B more specifically Map 5A or B, Map 5A or B reflects 6 7 the concept of equity and the community of interest 8 best and it represents the position of the Korean American community in Orange County. Q 10 Map 2 has significant flaw particularly because 11 separate Buena Park from the other north Orange 12 County cities including Fullerton, Brea, La Habra, 13 and Anaheim. 14 Instead it put Buena Park with Garden Grove, 15 Westminster, and Fountain Valley where the Vietnamese 16 American community predominantly is. Although we 17 love and have the greatest affection to our fellow 18 Vietnamese American community we do not share the 19 same mother language or home countries have different 20 political climate and we have different cultural 21 views and we have different religious background. 22 In the past 10 years most of the Korean American 23 in Garden Grove have moved their residences to the 24 north Orange County area including Buena Park was 25 largely left in Garden Grove, Korean American

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communities and some community organizations for 1 2 (Inaudible) elections residents count but not the location of businesses or work place. Why that's 3 make 5A or B reflect the community of interest from 4 the Korean American perspective. 5 The Korean American in Fullerton, Brea, La Habra, 6 7 and Anaheim all go to major Korean supermarkets in Buena Park. Korean American in Buena Park are 8 sending their children to the Fullerton Joint High 9 10 School district. 11 Korean American in Buena Park go to churches in 12 La Habra, Fullerton, Brea, and Anaheim, and the Korean American in Fullerton and Brea and Anaheim go 13 14 to the churches in Buena Park. 15 On the other hand there's a very little 16 commonality that we share with the Vietnamese 17 American in Garden Grove, Westminster, or Fountain 18 Valley. Therefore the Korean American in Orange 19 County would like to urge the County Supervisors to 20 select Map 5A or B. Thank you so much. 21 JOYCE AHN: Good morning everyone. My name is 22 I'm the president of the Orange County Joyce Ahn. 23 Korean US Citizens league and I'm also a city 24 commissioner for Buena Park for cultural and fine 25 arts.

As a long-time Orange County resident, I came 1 2 here today to speak my voice. I oppose Map 2 or its variations, but support Map 5A or 5B. 3 Um, Map 2 separates Buena Park from the other 4 north Orange County cities Fullerton La Habra or 5 Brea, for example. 6 7 Buena Park shares the Navigation Center, a 8 homeless shelter with Brea, La Habra, Fullerton, and other north Orange County cities. Buena Park High 9 10 School consists of two-thirds of Buena Park students 11 and one third of Fullerton resident students. 12 The north end of Buena Park children go to 13 Fullerton Joint Union High School district that 14 covers Fullerton, La Habra, Brea, portions of 15 Anaheim, and Placentia. 16 Us Buena Park residents go to Trader Joes in La 17 We gas up at Costco in Fullerton. We grab Habra. some coffee in Buena Park, and we also, um, shop in 18 19 Brea Mall. 20 Now, the other north Orange County cities are 21 neighbors who share the community of interest, they 22 come to Buena Park to the three Korean supermarkets 23 at the corner of La Mirada and Beach Boulevard. 24 Therefore, we -- I oppose Map 2 and support Map 25 Um, 5B seems to represent fair equity and 5A or 5B.

11	We have been working with the immigrant community
12	in Orange County since 1997. And in 2019 we opened
13	our office in San Juan Capistrano.
14	In addition we are a member of the People's
15	Redistricting Alliance, a coalition of 16 community-
16	based organizations established um, state wide and
17	local redistricting process here in Orange County.
18	I am here in support of Proposal 5 and 5A or 5B.
19	For 35 years it's been CHIRLA's mission of achieving
20	a just society fully inconclusive of immigrants.
21	CHIRLA organizes individuals, communities, and
22	coalitions in order to build power, transfer public
23	opinion, and change policies.
24	Today we are here to provide feedback on Orange
25	County districts in and around Santa Ana. Immigrant
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communities in Santa Ana, Buena Park, Fullerton, and 1 other parts of Orange County where the global 2 epicenters of COVID 19 last year with many residents 3 who could not work from home. 4 This community lacks access to healthcare and 5 affordable housing which have been further 6 7 exacerbated by the pandemic. 8 We support 5, 5A, 5B because they respect all Latino communities not just those in Santa Ana. 9 10 Other maps are concerning due to the partition nature 11 which includes 2, 2A, 4, 4A, and 4B. These maps 12 leave Latinx communities in Buena Park, south 13 Fullerton, and east Garden Grove, and Tustin without 14 a voice by separating them from nearby communities which they have shared interest. 15 16 Please support proposals 5, 5A, and 5B. Thank 17 you. 18 KAREN DIAZ: Good afternoon, Board members. My 19 name is Karen Diaz and I'm the electoral field 20 manager for the Coalition for Humane Immigrant 21 Rights, CHIRLA. 22 Our mission is to achieve a just society full 23 inconclusive for immigrants. And today we're here to 24 support maps 5, 5A, and 5B. 25 I work as a community organizer knocking on doors

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1 and talking to community voters all across Orange 2 County. Um, we saw the need for engaging the community in 3 helping them get out the vote, fill in the census, 4 and now we're working with them on redistricting. 5 And through that we seen that the community 6 7 supports map -- the maps 5A, 5B, and 5. They not 8 only draw federal voting rights acts around communities of interest in Santa Ana but does so in a Q 10 way that ensures all Latinx communities in Orange 11 County have a voice. 12 As you deliberate on this maps, please take into 13 consideration the proportional representation of 14 immigrant communities. We have over 153,000 15 immigrants just residing in Santa Ana. That's 46 16 percent of the population. 17 These immigrant communities have a lot in common 18 with communities in south Fullerton and west Anaheim 19 and should be in the same district. 20 Our immigrants should -- our immigrant members 21 faced intimidation last year when the Trump 22 administration, um, to fill out the census which led 23 to an undercount. 24 These communities that rely so heavily on 25 solutions from the local government, um, to address 52

1 affordable housing, healthcare, and education are 2 relying on -- on maps that represent them. Additionally, I want to address my concerns over 3 partisan maps that leave Latinx communities outside 4 of Santa Ana without a voice. 5 These proposals are 2 and 2A which isolate 6 7 communities in Buena Park, south Fullerton, east 8 Garden Grove, and Tustin rather than draw them together with similar communities that are Latinx 9 10 nearby. 11 Proposals 4 and 4A, and 4B also isolate these communities in east Garden Grove. 12 13 Please, um, ensure fair representation for the 14 Latinx communities and immigrant communities and by 15 supporting and adopting proposals 5, 5A and 5B. 16 Thank you for your time today. 17 FAEZ NOWABI: Hello, my name is Faez Nowabi and I 18 serve as the policy and advocacy manager at the 19 council on American Islamic relations office. 20 I am a resident of the City of Orange and our 21 organization predominantly serves the AMEMSA 22 community that is the Arab, Middle Eastern, Muslim, 23 South Asian, and North African communities in Orange 24 County. 25 We are here as part of the People's Redistricting

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1 Alliance. And I want to urge the Board of 2 Supervisors -- the Board to -- to support maps 5, 5A, or 5B. 3 We find these maps are very inconclusive of all 4 of our communities of interest. This includes the 5 Arab, Middle Eastern, Muslim, South Asian, North 6 African communities. 7 8 These maps they keep Little Arabia intact. They also highlight the importance of keeping Irvine a 9 10 predominantly immigrant community together. 11 Also our community immigrant -- community 12 immigrant and refugee communities in Garden Grove, 13 Westminster, and Santa Ana are kept together also. 14 We also want to highlight the importance of 15 making sure that the maps that we support are non-16 partisan maps and keep in line with the 17 California's -- California Fair Maps Act. 18 Once again we urge the Board to support maps 5, 19 5A, or 5B. Latino Health Access 8 have been probably working alongside, um, the community residents for over 27 years providing 9 10 services that address immediate health needs while 11 providing information and facilitating opportunities 12 to increase civic participation and impact policies 13 that will help the social determinants they 14 experience. 15 I first want to thank you for your time and hard 16 work and dedication for your listening to our 17 testimonies and we are very appreciative of the -- of 18 your commitment to acknowledging our input. 19 I am here to support the Proposal 5, 5A, or 5B 20 which are supported by the supported by the People's 21 Redistricting Alliance map. 22 As you know Santa Ana is home to the largest and 23 most (Inaudible) Latinx community in Orange County. 24 And it is a major force contributing to and reshaping 25 the economic, social and cultural fabric of our 65

1 county.

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All in all, we support 5, 5A, and 5B because it respects the communities of interest in Santa Ana which have not been taken into consideration in the previous years.

Santa Ana is primarily composed of low-income and 6 7 mixed immigration status Latinx families. They are 8 extremely hard working families with many employed in essential jobs that unfortunately often overlooked 9 10 This makes affordable housing and underpaid. 11 difficult as more than 80 percent of residents in 12 Santa Ana are tented -- are tenants spending the 13 majority of the incomes on rent.

Yet they share a strong sense of community with a large number of community organizations and residentled groups that have come together over the years to promote the Latinx culture.

Therefore, we strongly believe the redistricting
process should not center around, um, partisanship
but should center around communities of interest
based on the Fair Maps Act.

All in all, we support the adaptation of 5, 5A,
or 5B because not only do they draw Federal Voting
Rights Act district around communities of interest in
Santa Ana but they also do so in a way that ensures

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Latinx communities in Orange County have a voice, are accurately represented, and are toply captured. Thank you and have a great day.

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MELANI DEFEFETA: Malo e lelei. My 4 Greetings. name is Melani Defefeta, I am a resident of 5 Huntington Beach and I am with Pacific Islander 6 7 Health Partnership a non-profit organization based in 8 Garden Grove. Our organization has served the native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander communities by working Q 10 closely with Asian American non-profit organizations 11 to serve low-income communities through patient 12 navigation and programs to reduce health disparities 13 in native Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders residing in Southern California. 14

15 I'm here in support of proposals 5, 5A, or 5B. 16 We support 5, 5A, or 5B because they respect all 17 Asian American, native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander 18 communities including Vietnamese Americans in Garden 19 Grove and Westminster, native Hawaiians and Pacific 20 Islanders in Garden Grove and Westminster, Korean 21 Americans in Buena Park and Fullerton and diverse 22 Asian American populations in Irvine.

The partisan maps are concerning because those
maps make it harder for us to serve our native
Hawaiian and Pacific Islander communities by

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1 providing health access and resources to them. 2 To guaranty fair representation for all Asian American, native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islanders, 3 please support proposals 5, 5A or 5B. Thank you for 4 your time. 5 EUSENIA TALMIRANO: Good afternoon Board members, 6 7 my name is Eusenia Talmirano and I'm the Orange 8 County organizer for the Coalition for Humane Immigrants Rights also known as CHIRLA. Q 10 I have been a resident of Anaheim, the city of 11 Anaheim for over 30 years. And I'm here in support 12 of proposals 5, 5A, or 5B. 13 As an Anaheim resident working throughout Orange 14 County I've noticed the imbalance of resources not only in education and in healthcare but we also lack, 15 um, imbalances within our low-income communities 16 17 where they lack access to higher quality education, low-income clinics, and language assistance. 18 19 We're also lacking community classes to help low-20 income community families not only thrive 21 economically but thrive physically and emotionally as 22 they feel safe in the welcoming community. 23 I'm here to express concern over partisan maps 24 that leave Latinx communities without representation. 25 I urge the Board to adopt map -- Map 5, 5A, or 5B to

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1 give our communities an opportunity to thrive. 2 Thank you for your time and consideration. KAYLA VILLEGAS: Hello, good afternoon, my name 3 is Kayla Villegas. I am the lead organizer for 4 Orange County Environmental Justice. We are part of 5 the People's Redistricting Alliance. 6 7 As an environmental justice org we are explicitly 8 concerned about the maps proposed and how they break up environmental justice communities throughout 9 10 Orange County. 11 These configurations break up the influence of 12 environmental justice concerns in south Fullerton, 13 west Anaheim, and even some of the environmental 14 justice interests in Irvine near the airport. 15 In any case, our communities across the county 16 are heavily impacted by housing, insecurity rent, 17 police brutality, and health concerns from soil led, 18 poisoning our kids, um, and water quality poisoning 19 our families or air quality impacting our work place. 20 This needs to stop and we need to have adequate 21 representation which leads to our concerns over the 22 proposed and altered maps. These partisan maps are 23 breaking our communities and breaking the law for all 24 of the reasons mentioned by the ACLU. 25 Please comply with federal and state laws and

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follow the community's maps 5, 5A, or 5B. These are the only maps that preserve our communities. Thank you.

Thank you. 12 CLERK OF THE BOARD: Mr. Chairman, our last 13 speaker is Zachary Gricky, and then County Counsel 14 has two comments to read into the record. 15 CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you. 16 ALEJANDRA: Yes. My name Zachary Gricky and I'm 17 a political science student at UC Irvine. Т 18 represent over 6000 students in the UCI undergraduate 19 student senate. 20 I'm here to today speak about UCI's political 21 representation in -- over the next 10 years if these 22 maps get adopted. I'd like to voice my support for 23 maps 5 and 5A as I believe these maps best represent 24 my classmates by keeping the city of Irvine together, 25 keeping our off-campus student populations together

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and keeping UC Irvine and Irvine Valley College united in one single district.

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I hope the Board will adopt one of these maps as 3 the final map. UCI student are united by shared 4 customs and issues like a lack of affordable housing 5 near campus. And UCI students are not just clustered 6 7 around the main campus. We have students that live 8 off campus in central Irvine neighbors like Woodbridge, the Irvine Business Complex in Irvine Q 10 Spectrum because they cannot afford to live near 11 campus where rents can be as high as three and a half thousand dollars a month. 12

My student senate colleagues and I voted unanimously to endorse maps 5 and 5A because they keep Irvine whole which better keeps UCI students together in a single district.

17 I also want to express my and my classmates' 18 opposition to a handful of maps that I believe will 19 divide UCI students off campus population. 20 Specifically I want to express my opposition to maps 21 2, 5A1 and 5B1 because these maps divide Irvine at 22 the 405 which I cannot reiterate enough is a 23 terrible, terrible way to divide Irvine. 24 If these maps were adopted, they would draw many 25 of UCI's off-campus students into an entirely

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1 separate district from their on-campus classmates. 2 Using the 405 as a dividing line also separates Irvine Valley College from the -- from the UCI main 3 campus which also dilutes the Irvine College 4 students' ability to influence their elected 5 officials. 6 7 These maps are the wrong way to divide Irvine. 8 And I hope that the Board will reject any map that would divide Irvine along the 405. 9 10 If you must divide Irvine, please do it at or 11 north of the 5 like map 5B does. I hope that the Board will consider our feedback 12 13 and adopt a map that is truly representative of all 14 Irvine and its college students. Please adopt either 15 Map 5, 5A, or if you have to, I can stomach 5B. 16 Thank you very much for your time and I hope you 17 all have a great day. Thank you so much for your 18 leadership on this. Thank you. 19 CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you. County Counsel, please 20 go ahead. 21 COUNTY COUNSEL PAGE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, 22 Felicity Figueroa of Irvine writes, "The People's 23 redistricting Alliance of Orange County, the PRA, is 24 a multi-racial coalition of a community-based 25 organization and residence. They've drawn a

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redistricting map that centers the lived experiences and priorities and needs of our most vulnerable communities those that have been historically marginalized by local government.

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This map will empower low-income communities and working families, sectors of our population that have been ignored and denied representation for far too long. The OCPRA map has made communities of interest its top priority when drawing lines considering the important testimonies of residents from communities that have been harmed by the current configuration.

12 This map will correct the problems for the 13 current configuration while complying with legal 14 requirements of the Voting Rights Act and Fair Maps 15 Act.

16 The current map configuration has disenfranchised 17 communities of color by prioritizing the interest of 18 one political party over all the rest. The PRA map 19 is very similar to Proposal 5 which is why I strongly 20 support Proposal 5 and could support Proposal 5A.

21 While the other proposals unnecessarily split up 22 many communities of interest, proposals 5 and 5A are 23 the only maps that have made communities of interest 24 the top priority when drawing lines and taking in the 25 important testimonies of residents from communities

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1 that have been historically marginalized by the 2 county. For this reason I urge you to adopt Proposal 5 or 3 4 5A." 5 And Naz Hamid of Irvine writes, "As a resident of Irvine I would like to voice my opposition to 6 7 proposed Map 4C1. I believe this map violates the 8 California Fair Maps Act and politically targeting a 9 sitting candidate. 10 This map also dilutes the AAPI and Latino 11 representation much more than other maps. 12 Lastly this map unnecessarily splits 14 cities 13 among different supervisor districts and I believe 14 that were where possible cities should be in the same 15 supervisor district. 16 I strongly support Map 5 and strongly oppose Map 17 4C1." That's all I have. Thank you. 18 CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you. I will close the public 19 hearing at this time. 20 111 21 111 22 23 24 25 75
